

Whether it's assisting in the cleaning of the altar linens or the sanctuary of the church, to working in our food pantry to working in the boutique Alice has shown herself to be a tireless member of our OLM family.

Thank you Alice for being a wonderful example of faith and good works! I must tell you, choosing a St. Agnes Medal recipient is not an easy task. It's not because we don't have enough worthy recipients –it's because we have too many! Alice is one of too many to name who do so much for us and our community. I want to take this opportunity to thank all of you who work to make our parish such an outstanding place! Here let me include a special thank you to all the ladies who work in our Boutique and to the men and women who give their time and talent in our Parish Social Ministry program. Thank you all for every act of kindness and for your tireless efforts to reach out to those in need!

Let me wish you a Happy Thanksgiving! I hope and pray that this very American feast will be a time to celebrate family, friends and of course (my favorite) FOOD! Thank you to all who participated in the drive for food for our pantry and the creation of Thanksgiving Baskets. Every year the need becomes greater and resources thinner, but your generosity and the generosity of our brothers and sisters in our local parishes helps fill the gap. We need to remember that in a land of opportunity and plenty there are still many who are struggling to make ends meet and many who can't find adequate work. Hunger is not just a problem at the holidays, but 365 days a year.

I want to take this opportunity to invite you to our Thanksgiving Mass. This is one of my favorite celebrations as we gather to give thanks, not because we have to, but because we want to! So please, before you get on the road to visit family or get too involved in the kitchen, pop the bird in the oven and come and join us. The Mass will be at 9:00 am. It is the only Mass that day. Our choirs have been working hard to prepare beautiful music. What better way to truly give thanks than to come to our family table to give thanks to the one who is the giver of all good gifts: God!

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King. This feast marks the end of our liturgical year and the beginning of a new year with the First Sunday of Advent next weekend. The New Year is marked by a new cycle of readings from scripture. It is also the official end of the Year of Mercy established by Pope Francis. This weekend we complete cycle C readings and the emphasis on our Sunday gospel readings from Luke and next week we begin cycle A with the Gospel readings coming from the gospel of Mark.

This Solemnity was instituted in 1925 by Pope Pius XI in response to World War I and a growing nationalism that ultimately lead to the Second World War a few years later. Coming out one of the darkest periods to date in world history where the world saw war on a global scale, Pope Pius saw the need to refocus humanities gaze not on political power, but on God's true and eternal power. With the Second Vatican Council the solemnity was moved to the last Sunday of Ordinary Time to mark the end of the Liturgical year. The celebration highlights Jesus as our King and Shepherd and this week's gospel is the wonderful parable of the sheep and the goats. From Jesus time even until today, Shepherds graze sheep and goats together. The goats needing warmth at night and the sheep preferring to the open air, the herds are separated. To Jesus community this would have been a normal sight. Sheep were a more valuable commodity as well. More attention would be given to them since both wool and meat could provide so much more. In the parable the sheep are given the privileged position of being on the right side of the sheepherd since they had the greater value. **Continued** \rightarrow



OLM Weekly

This week's readings have a strong eschatological (the end of time) emphasis. Naturally, this is a reflection of the feast we celebrate, but also prepares us for the beginning of Advent which starts next Sunday. The Church asks us to look at our lives and take stock of where we are at in preparing to meet the Lord on judgment day. Like the sheep and the goats spoken of in the parable we will be asked to give an account of our actions in this life. This year I think this reading is especially significant given the Jubilee we have been celebrating. The list of characterizations of a good and faithful member of the Lord's flock has come to be known as the 'Corporal Works of Mercy'. So how have we done in this Jubilee Year? Have we grown more merciful? Are we Merciful like the Father, as Pope Francis has challenged us to be? Do we love our neighbor as our self? Just because the Jubilee Year is ended, the call to be merciful has not. If anything, this year should have refocused each of us for the enduring need for each of us to be more merciful. Today, as we begin to prepare to celebrate a new year in the life of the Church, let's keep the jubilee going! If each of us can be more merciful like the Father, how much more will God be prepared to say to us, "Come you who are blessed and enter the Kingdom prepared for you!"

New York Times Wants Nursing Homes to Starve Patients to death "Without Asking Permission"

If there is any aspect of the culture of death not supported and promoted by the *New York Times*, I haven't seen it.

Now, Paula Span, the Gray (Ashen?) Lady's "The New Old Age" columnist pushes suicide by starvation, known in euthanasia parlance as "voluntary stop eating and drinking."

It is worth nothing here that Compassion and Choices, formerly known more honestly as the Hemlock Society, promotes VSED even for healthy elderly people who want to die.

Euthanasia death zealots have pushed various methods of becoming dead for a long time, of course. But it is shocking that a columnist on elderly issues for the nation's most prominent newspaper would join so enthusiastically in under the pretext of describing a VSED conference she attended. *From, "The VSED Exit:* A Way to speed Up Dying Without Asking Permission:"

Unlike aid with dying, now legal in five states, it doesn't require governmental action or physicians' authorization. Patients don't need a terminal diagnosis, and they don't have to prove mental capacity. They do need resolve. :It's for strong willed, independent people with very supportive families," said Dr. Timothy Quill, a veteran palliative care physician at the University of Rochester Medical Center.

This is suicide by starvation, and it is agonizing. That is why it usually requires a doctor to provide palliation to make the process bearable. But that is assisting suicide just as much as supplying poison pills. As I have written previously, death zealots even want nursing homes *required to starve their patients* to death who become incompetent if so instructed in as advance directive:

The question grows much murkier for patients with dementia or mental illness who have specified VSED under certain circumstances through advance directives. Several states, including Wisconsin and New York, forbid health care surrogates to stop food and fluids. (Oregon legislators, on the other hand, are considering drafting a bill to allow surrogates to withhold nutrition.)

Advance directives give instructions about medical treatments wanted or unwanted. Spoon feeding is not a medical treatment. It is humane care. Imagine the deleterious impact on the healthcare sector if those who wish to become nurses and caregivers knew they could be forced to starve their patients to death, even when they willingly eat and drink. The entire article fails to present one voice arguing against VSED, but sure boosts it:

A 2003 study of hospice nurses in Oregon who had cared for VSED patients. Rating their deaths on a scale from 0 to9 (a very good death), the nurses assigned a median score of 8.

Nearly all of the Patients died within 15 days. The slower pace of death from fasting, compared with ingesting barbiturates, gives people time to say goodbye and, for the first few days, to change their minds. Several conference speakers described patients who had fasted and stopped a few times before continuing until death.

Geriatric depression is a terrible problem in our society. The last thing depressed oldsters need is a writer on aging issues pushing self-starvation as a splendid way out.


